Dear Parents/Guardians,

- This term, Year 5 & 6 students are asked to present a 3 minute speech during Week 8 for our Public Speaking Competition.
- Three students from Year 5 and three students from Year 6 will be selected to represent Stage 3 as part of the school Public Speaking Competition on Friday of Week 9.
- The winner and runner-up will represent our school at both the Galgabba Public Speaking Competition and the Zone Public Speaking Competition during Term 3.

Public speaking opportunities provide students with the opportunity to develop skills and confidence to speak in real life situations.

Each student will <u>present their 3 minute speech to the class</u> in Week 8. The timetable below indicates when it is your child's day to present.

We have included some tips for students as well as some topic ideas. Topics are completely open and not limited to this list of ideas, however speeches that are entertaining or those with a message are more competitive. Please keep speeches sensible and respectful.

NB: RULE Children who are still speaking when the continuous bell rings will be penalised 10 marks as they have not completed their conclusion.

- Timekeepers will be used to ensure time limits are not exceeded.
- Students are permitted to select their own topics. **NO PROPS** are to be used.
- Students are **NOT** to say good morning/afternoon, introduce themselves or their topic or thank the audience for listening at the end.

Tips for a great speech

Choosing a topic

• Consider the audience for your speech. You will be speaking to students from Grade K-6 and teachers. Your speech needs to be **appropriate** but must also **appeal to this age group**. (Try not to choose an advanced topic that other students will not understand or one that is only funny to your class).

Writing your Speech

- Include an interesting first and last line. These are the parts people will remember most.
 They need to grab the audience's attention. Dare to be different, creative and original! DO
 NOT say good morning/afternoon, introduce yourself or state the name of your speech.
- Give your speech a purpose or a point. Don't just ramble on.

Sustained Audience Engagement

- The judges will be noting how the **audience**, particularly the student audience, is responding.
- Make **eye** contact with the audience (not the judges they are invisible) and use **facial expressions.**
- Project your voice and speak clearly. Try to stay calm & not rush or you will 'throw away'
 your great & clever lines or even start to mumble. Varying the tone & volume of your
 voice will make your speaking more interesting.
- Use **humour** to get the audience reacting, but take care not to overdo the 'toilet' humour or be too colloquial with the expressions you use.
- Have **small** palm cards, not sheets of paper **if you need** use these as cues to prompt the next idea you will talk about. If you just read, the audience will be bored as you can't give them your wonderful smile and eye contact.
- Early Stage 1 (Kindergarten) palm cards can have pictures/drawings on them to help.
- Avoid singing or reciting poems as you will have changed your Public Speaking into a different type of performance – 1 or 2 very short quotes are OK.
- Be **informative**, in an interesting way, and **stay on the topic**.

<u>Presentation</u>

- Be **enthusiastic** this can be contagious for the audience, so look excited, smile and be confident *you can do it!*
- Be **prepared** The more you know your speech, the more confident you will be on the day. It also means you will probably speak louder, more clearly and give more eye contact.
- **Read aloud** as you practice. This will help you with timing that is more accurate and give you confidence. You will also learn your speech faster.
- Practise looking around the room as you speak. This will help you with **eye contact** but also stop you looking at the adjudicator. Eye contact maintains your connection with the audience.
- At home you have rehearsed in front of the mirror, your family may have helped you with hints or suggestions and you may have rehearsed in front of your classmates your teacher has probably helped out too, so you are well prepared & have the **timing** right. BUT, take care not to be 'over rehearsed' as you will lose your natural freshness & spark.
- **Stance** stand with your feet a little way apart so you look confident. Feel free to move if you need to add a big gesture, but try not to sway or jiggle or stand stiff as a pole.
- **Gestures** use these to emphasis a point, assist your humour or sustain the audience engagement be comfortable with them so they look natural & spontaneous.
- **Gimmicks** such as "put your hand up if..." to the audience shouldn't be overused.

Conclusion

Try to finish leaving the audience buzzing – be creative, original and funny. You **DO NOT**need to say 'thank you for listening' or 'thank you for listening to my story'. (We already
know you are very polite)
